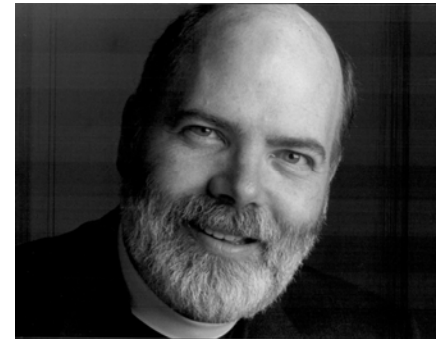

SUMMERS END . . .

. . . is such a mixed bag. Even in our technologic world that permits us to overcome the seasons with air conditioning, central heat, and artificial lights, we have a DNA intuition that summer is a time to rest a bit, to play a lot, and to enjoy the longer hours of sunlight.

This is obviously less dramatic in San Diego than it was in my former home of Seattle, where we all knew we had only about eight weeks to manufacture our year's supply of vitamin D from the sun's rays. There church attendance often fell by at least half in June, July and August.



Here summer's attendance is boosted by all the visitors that make a point to come to our wonderful church, and the reduction in numbers is not nearly so dramatic.

“Let us consider how to provoke one another to love and good deeds, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day approaching.”

(Hebrews 10:24)

Even so, come Labor Day I think that it is fair to ask that members make a point to come to church faithfully. We build the habits of our lives by putting routines in place, and one habit we should not neglect is to pause each week to give thanks and praise to God.

“One can certainly thank God on the golf course or the beach!” True enough, but there are differences between such private devotion and the corporate worship of the church. A retiring leader in business or industry may be most moved by a few words of gratitude expressed by a colleague in private, but that retiree will certainly feel broadly appreciated and honored by a farewell banquet that makes a big deal of her career. And that honored retiree will certainly notice, and perhaps be disappointed in, those who neglected to attend the banquet. Likewise, there is a difference between a moment of thanks to

Vestry Report for July 2007

The July meeting of the Vestry, though reduced in attendance by summer vacations, continue to address important ongoing projects.

Continuing discussion was held on a series of **Identity Statements**, which began as a brainstorming session at the vestry retreat led by our Rector. These Identity Statements are a new way of thinking about defining the mission and ministry of our church. A committee has been working on the wording of these statements and they are now completed and ready for vestry approval.

Ongoing discussion was had about the repair to our facility and the philosophy behind hiring contractors. Careful and thoughtful consideration was given to the discussion.

The **Building Committee** also **will be presenting its' recommendation for the handicapped accessible rest room addition to the parish at a Forum on Sunday, September 23**. This is the culmination of many years of work by this dedicated committee and will be important to attend.

The Centennial Tea on November 9th will be held at the La Jolla Woman's Club and plans will be made public in September. 

Building Committee to Offer the Restroom Proposal on Sept. 23

Children's Program with "Kids' Kreations" at the Same Hour


After months of deliberation, planning, and exploration the St. James Building Committee has a proposal for how to create handicapped accessible toilets near our worship space.

For all good reasons our church made a commitment three years ago to find a way to create restrooms that would be accessible and easily available to all people who come to our church for worship, concerts, weddings or funerals. However, modifying a beautiful, historic and all-concrete building has presented numerous challenges.

The Building Committee has developed a proposal it concludes is the best option available, but as with all the options, it has trade-offs of gain and loss. We want to share our solution with the congregation on Sunday, Sept. 23, immediately after the 10:00 Service.

The meeting will take place in St. James Hall from 11:30 to 1:00. The Children's program for those not wishing to attend the meeting will be in the Van Schaick Room. Both meeting places will include lunch.

After the Vestry presents their proposal for the new toilets there will be time for member questions and feedback, concluding with a referendum of member opinion on the proposal.

The following Sunday, Sept. 30th at 11:30 am, in a special meeting of the Vestry in the Van Schaick room. The Vestry will hold a brief public deliberation on the proposal and vote whether to adopt the proposal or not. Please come and take part. Those of us on the committee hope for a green light to move ahead with this major improvement to our facility, but we want to know we have developed a solution. 

The vestry meetings are open to all, and you are invited to attend. **The meetings are generally held on the fourth Tuesday of each month at 6:30.** At each meeting a member of the vestry leads the group in prayer and ends the evening with a compline, which is a service for the end of the day. This is not just a Board of Directors meeting, but rather a spiritual exercise in which we invite the presence of the Holy Spirit to guide us in our discussions and decisions.

God in private reverie and an hour of hymns, praise, and ceremonial worship by hundreds of people gathered to remember that “all things come of Thee, O Lord.” I think God notices whether we make worshipping a big deal or whether we make it a tip of the hat.

There is sincerity and authenticity in the private moments of thanksgiving, but the gathering of the church also speaks to the wider world of faithfulness and belief. Too many who decry the loss of a moral center in today’s society fail to see that their own decision whether to attend church based on “feeling like it” or “having enough time” contributes to that very loss. If worship becomes a luxury, then faith becomes just another commodity in our consumption driven society. Faith literally means going through the motions. Children notice when adults fail to practice what they preach, and the wider world notices whether churches are overflowing or suffer indifference. The world is actually hungry for proof that faithful people really believe what they claim.

Finally, private moments of devotion are among the most profound we experience, but our great need is to have those profound experiences sustained and honored. Kept in private, our

recollection of those spiritual moments will begin to cloud with doubt or exaggerate into grandiosity. The church’s gathering each week grounds our personal experiences with words of scripture, with carefully crafted hymns, with sermons and common prayer. It gives us a chance to meet other faithful people in conversation and friendship. It imposes on us the need to see our private faithfulness in the context of the broad mission and humanity God entrusts to us who follow Jesus Christ.

Those of us who plan and lead our worship do a good job being respectful of the effort it takes to come to St. James on a Sunday morning. Our music is consistently inspiring, our readers and ushers prepare seriously, our preaching is thoughtfully drawn from dozens of years of theological study and prayer. In fact, there are few places in this country where a Sunday gathering of the faithful is more beautiful and more inspiring than in our own church.

Labor Day is our last big weekend of the summer vacation. The 9th of September we celebrate our involvement in Sri Lanka with a reception following the 10 am service. On the 16th we have our Rally Sunday, and the official kickoff for Sunday

School and the autumn schedule, and we’ll have a celebration of that day with food and fun and the last hour of the annual Golden Elephant Sale.

On November 4th our Bishop visits to help us celebrate our 100th birthday as a congregation. On the 9th we celebrate the birthday with a Centennial Tea. Summer ends, but the life of our church moves into full swing.

EVENSONG

Evensong will be held at 5 PM in St. Mary's Chapel on The Bishop's School Campus, the second Sunday of each month, October through March.

The music sung as part of the **Evensong** service is wide-ranging, and is based on a core Anglican literature developed over the past 400 years.

The service contains a number of themes—the interaction between God and his people as presented in the *Psalms*; a radical and world-changing encounter with God as described by Mary in the *Magnificat*; and the depiction of a God who always keeps promises, as described by Simeon in the *Nunc dimittis*. However, three words may be useful points of departure: light, conversation, and time.

Light. By its presence, absence, and invocation, light is central to Evensong.

Conversation. Attendance at Choral Evensong has been described as dropping in on a conversation that has been in progress for hundreds of years and will continue for hundreds of years. One may choose to join in the conversation or simply listen.

Time. Sunday evenings seem to be a time when even the busiest of us may pause, take a breath, and collect our thoughts for the coming week. Time to pray, time to listen, time to think—these are some of the many gifts offered by Evensong.

The St. James Music Series

We are honored to open the 23rd annual St. James Music Series with our own **St. James Choir** and orchestra. Also featured will be beloved guest artist **Gustavo Romero**. The centerpiece of this program will be a setting of the Requiem Mass for choir, soloists and orchestra by Malcolm Archer, the Music Director at St. Paul's Cathedral in London. **(October 21, 2007)**
